Y READERS



Community Need

Following two disrupted school years due to the pandemic, the percentage of CMS third graders scoring proficient in reading decreased from 57% in spring 2019 to 43% in spring 2022. At Title I schools this number was lower with only 28% of students demonstrating reading proficiency at the end of the 2021-2022 school year. In addition to academic support, Y Readers meets a range of critical community needs, including childcare, access to food, enrichment opportunities, and social-emotional support.

Overview

Y Readers is designed to provide the additional support that students need to be proficient in reading by the end of third grade. The program operates as an afterschool and summer model, providing tutoring during out-of-school time hours to students in grades K-3 who are reading below grade level. Certified teachers and teacher assistants provide literacy instruction based on students' needs, and students also have the opportunity to participate in a variety of enrichment activities, including physical activity, art, and field trips.

SUMMER LITERACY INFUSION



Community Need

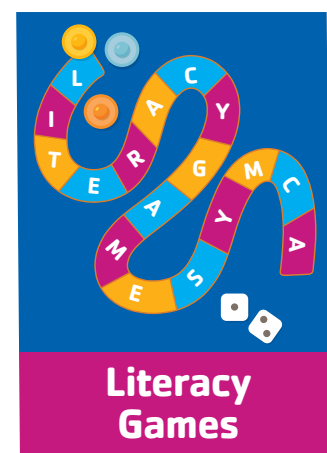
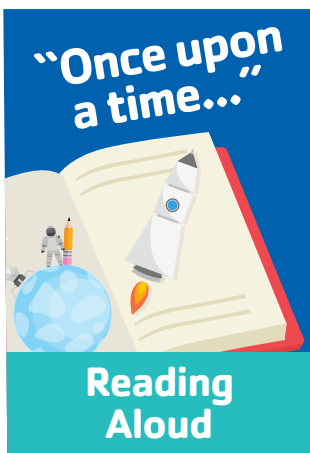
Not all students in our community have access to high quality literacy materials and content during the summer. This inequitable access, combined with the continued effects of the pandemic and two disrupted school years, has had a significant impact on students and schools.

Research on summer learning loss consistently shows that many kids fall behind 2-3 months in reading between May and August. The cumulative effect of the “summer slide” means that kids continue to fall farther behind as they progress through school. By ninth grade, two-thirds of the achievement gap in reading can be attributed to what happens during the summer.

Overview

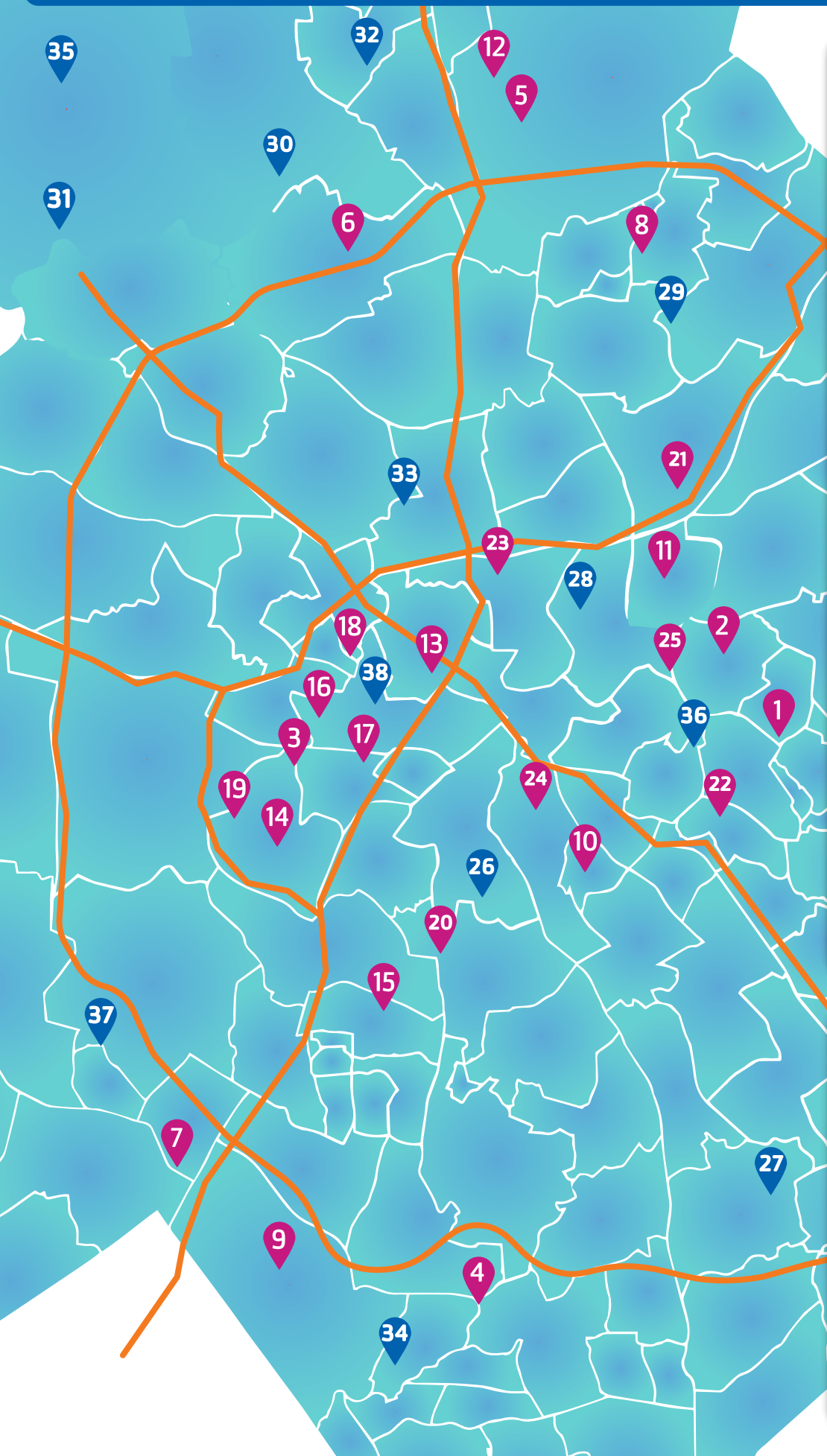
The Summer Literacy Infusion (SLI) model combines high quality literacy instruction with family resources to help students maintain their reading level over the summer. Literacy activities are integrated into traditional summer camp programming 4-5 days per week for 60 minutes per day. Certified teachers serve as literacy coaches to plan and facilitate activities and to support camp staff in implementation of literacy practices.

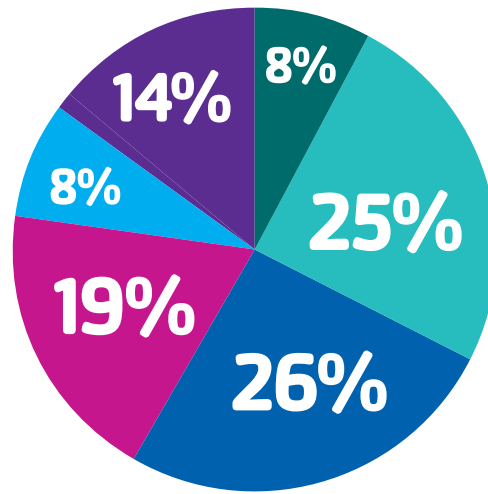

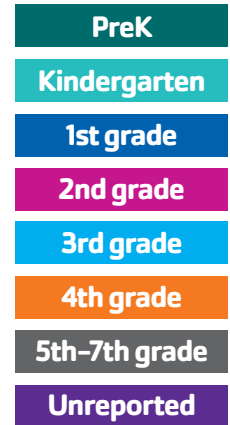
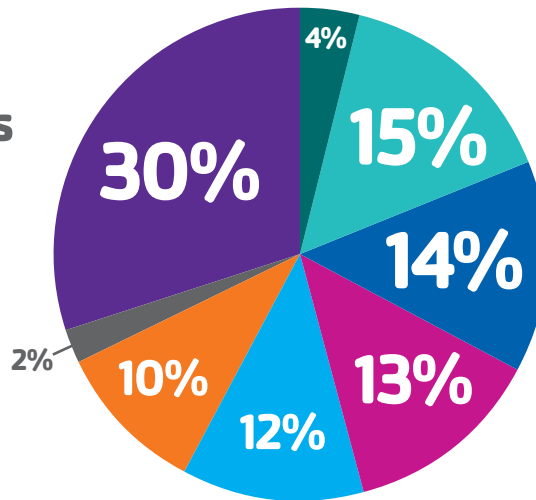

Campers participating in Summer Literacy Infusion are assessed at the beginning and end of summer using DIBELS Nonsense Word Fluency or Oral Reading Fluency. Outcomes reported are based on students who completed both pre and post assessments. Sample sizes are low due to movement of campers across different camps throughout the summer, which matches historical trends. The reportable group for Y camps was 289 students (15%) and the reportable group for community partner camps was 341 students (38%).
